#### Christmas recipe

Why not try making some delicious Christmas ginger bread during the Christmas holidays?

Remember, always make sure to get help from a grown up!

### What you will need:

100g salted butter

3 tbsp golden syrup

1 tbsp ground ginger

225g plain flour 50g icing sugar

1 tsp ground cinnamon

100g dark muscovado sugar

1/2 tsp bicarbonate of soda



#### Method:

**STEP 1** – Heat the butter, syrup and sugar together in a small pan until melted, stirring occasionally. Set aside to cool slightly.

**STEP 2** — Mix together the bicarb, ginger, cinnamon and flour. Pour in the syrup mixture and stir. Use your hands to form a dough.

**STEP 3** – Put the dough on a sheet of baking parchment, shape into a rectangle, and lay another sheet of parchment on top of it. Roll the dough and transfer to a baking sheet to keep it flat. Chill in the fridge for 1 hr.

**STEP 4** – Heat the oven to 190C/170C fan/gas 5. Cut out shapes from the dough using a cookie cutter.

**STEP 5** – Place the shapes, spread apart, on the lined baking sheet, and bake for 10-12 mins. Depending on how thick your dough is, you may need to increase the cooking time a little!

**STEP 6** – Meanwhile, mix the icing sugar with 1-2 tbsp water. Decorate the cooled biscuits with the icing using a piping bag with a thin nozzle.
